Welcome to Mexico City and to the Second World Planning Schools Congress. When I launched the idea of a World Congress of Planning Schools in my presidential address at the first joint congress of the ACSP-AESOP] in Oxford in 1991, I hardly expected that this rather wild idea would come true in the first World Planning Schools Congress in Shanghai in 2001. This first Congress became a real landmark. While in 2001 four planning schools associations joined together to hold our first World Congress, in 2006 nine planning schools associations have now joined forces for our second World Congress.

Today we celebrate the fact that the World Planning Schools Congress was not 'a one shot' event. We are celebrating the fact that the World Planning Community has matured and has managed to turn diversity into an asset. In addition to the intellectual exchanges that took place, the contacts made in Shanghai also provided opportunities for concrete collaborative projects. In what has become known as the Shanghai Statement, the leaders of planning schools associations all agreed on the goal of increasing mutual communication in order to improve the quality and visibility of planning and planning education. To achieve this goal, the Global Planning Education Association Network was established. Today, GPEAN consists of nine planning schools associations, representing all the continents of the world. GPEAN has taken several initiatives to promote international exchange in planning scholarship. The Dialogues book series is definitely the most tangible result of this international exchange.

These World Congresses build transcontinental bridges. They create settings in which associations, individual schools and their faculties can appraise both what is common and what is distinctive and varied in planning. We strive together to encourage a proactive and critical approach to scholarship. The World Congress serves as a platform for intellectual exchange and is instrumental in building and maintaining scholarly networks. In this congress some 40 business meetings are scheduled to promote cooperation among the nine organizations. All this should make us aware of how crucial these congresses are as a motor for further worldwide cooperation.

The overall theme of this congress, 'Diversity and multiplicity: a new agenda for the World Planning Community', provides an opportunity to address a wide range of topics that planning professionals and others involved in planning education will be faced with in the coming era.

As always, these congresses are only possible through the work of many, many dedicated and creative volunteers. I owe the greatest debt to my friends and colleagues of the International Steering Committee: David Amborski, Carlos Vainer, Sergio Flores, Michael Gunder, Alain Motte, Tumsify Nnkya, Zhiqiang Wu and, last but definitely not least, Johanna Looye. I want to offer special thanks to the co-chairs of the twenty tracks. With their help, we were able to organize a thorough and conscientious peer review process with clear benefits for the quality of papers and presentations. I also want to thank the local organizing committee, whose members bore the heavy burden of the day-to-day work behind the scenes.

With all of you, I look forward to an exciting exchange of ideas and to the growth of cooperation and new friendships in this Second World Planning Schools Congress.

Since its designation as a World Heritage Site, Mexico City's Historic District has seen numerous interventions bent on stopping its deterioration and restoring its built patrimony. The Federal District's previous administration adopted business leader Carlos Slim's ambitious proposal of urban renewal concentrated in a specific part of this, one of the world's largest historical districts.

This has also resulted in a local art movement nurtured on the local culture. The negative side to the local scene includes a growing violence associated with mafias which have long held sway in the area.

During the 1950's, the area just to the south of the Alameda was one of the most dynamic and privileged areas in the Historic District. Over the years the more bankable activities moved away plunging the area into disuse, a process significantly worsened by the 1985 earthquake. In the year 2000 a series of real estate projects were launched, spearheading an ambitious program of urban renewal in the Historic District. The project's success is shown by the fact that most of the congress' guests will be staying in hotels created by said project.

Being located on a lake bed, Mexico City has long faced the menace of flooding. Since the 1970's the solution to this problem has been the deep sewer system meant to evacuate all residual waters and thus avoid flooding. Whilst this public work has not been totally finished due to the scale of the project, it has on several occasions proven to be useful yet now begins to suffer from the effects of the subsoil's instability.

Despite adapting to city life, these groups continue to maintain their own culture, for which they have long been socially marginalized.

Consequences of this project are rather contradictory due to its economic success, problems with the urban infrastructure, and the overall spatial segregation.

The eastern part of the metropolitan area houses a series of immense settlements which were originally built illegally and precariously (with poor building materials) but have over the years consolidated themselves (to different degrees) with the rest of the city. This evolution has largely been due to time and to the timely application of development policies. Nezahualcoyotl City (first settled in the 1940's) and Chalco County (a series of loosely connected precarious neighborhoods first built in the 1990's under the federal government's auspices) stand out because of

their sheer size. By analyzing these areas one can determine the pros and cons of spontaneous urbanization and self-construction.

I2 Rich and Poor Irregular Settlements within the Southern Periphery

The southern portion of the metropolitan area extends over a mountain chain that was declared a Green Belt in the 1970's. This has not deterred the development of irregular settlements (without legal land title) at both ends of the socio-economic spectrum.

I4 Informal Commerce within the Historic District

Commerce along the public right of way has a strong tradition in Mexico City. Over the last 25 years this activity has seen exponential growth due to the deterioration of the economic situation of large sectors of the population. These sectors have resorted to employment in informal activities tied to information and merchandise piracy and contraband. Yet the authorities as well as formal commerce have maintained an ambiguous stand towards informal commerce (sometimes fighting its presence and other times offering to incorporate it into the formal sector) which can best be defined as tolerating its presence in exchange for political support. Within this context, initiatives for urban renewal in the Historic District face the daunting task of managing the informal occupation of public areas and the anarchy it breeds.

In the city's southeastern periphery lie the remaining vestiges of the original ecosystem which dominated the Valley of Mexico until the 19th century. At the moment the Borough of Xochimilco's agricultural areas (also a World Heritage Site) face increasing pressure from the city's physical growth through real estate speculation and the informal occupation of the Chinampas (traditional cultivation parcels). What it comes down to is a search by the local authorities to find ways to balance the preservation of this unique patrimony and the interests of its inhabitants.

The construction of densely populated housing projects was the government's solution to housing shortages throughout the 1950's and 60's. Although they have successively suffered from physical and social degradation today, these spaces continue to be considered a viable housing alternative to the extent that they constitute expressions of modernity within the urban fabric. Nonoalco Tlatelolco (1964), built on top of a prehispanic settlement, is by far the most famous project having served as a backdrop for numerous manifestations of recent Mexican history.

The inhabitants of these projects, built further and further away from the location of jobs and public services, suffer from their lack of integration with the urban fabric. This is a testament to the fact that a city is much more than a bunch of houses.

7. Congress Guidelines

7.1 VENUE

Mexico City's Palace of Mining (Palacio de Minería) is an architectural masterpiece of the neoclassical style in the Americas as it manages to capture the elegant forms and spaces as well as its use of light characteristic of the style. Built between 1797 and 1812 by the Spanish architect and sculptor Manuel Tolsá, the Palace was conceived as the seat of the Real Seminario de Minería with the purpose of forming mining engineers.

The Palace is located on Tacuba Street, in front of Manuel Tolsá Plaza which was inaugurated in 1979 with the placing of Tolsá's equestrian statue of Charles IV of Spain. Architectural highlights within the Palace include: The Old Chapel, The Hall of Acts, The Dean's Hall, The Schoolmaster's Hall, The Gallery of Deans, and the Library. In many of these rooms one can still observe magnificent 19th century murals whilst in the newly converted Manuel Tolsá Museum works by the artists and his colleagues can be found. Another feature of the Palace are the five patios of which the main two-bodied patio is the most famous due to its surrounding arches, beautiful pillars, and singular columns which give way to a colonial staircase.

This historic construction forms part of the National Autonomous University of Mexico's (UNAM) artistic and cultural patrimony and lies under the care of the Faculty of Engineering. Currently the building houses parts of said faculty such as its historical archives, the College of Mexican Petroleum Engineers, and the Mexican Academy of Engineering.

Due to its beauty, the halls of the Palacio de Minería have over the years served as the seat of many important academic and cultural activities on both a national and international level. Because of this it gives us pride that this historic site will hold the 2nd World Planning Schools Congress, Mexico City 2006.

We hope that all visitors take advantage of the Palace's location and services which provide a view to the workings of Mexico City's everyday life.

Getting There:

The Palacio de Minería is located within Mexico City's Historic District (Centro Histórico), in front of the National Art Museum (Museo Nacional de Arte) and next to the Post Office Building (Edificio de Correos). The Palace is only a few blocks away from the city's Main Square (Zócalo) which is surrounded by the Cathedral, National Palace (Palacio Nacional), Main Temple (Templo Mayor) Museum, and City Hall (Edificio de Gobierno del Distrito Federal). The Palace of Fine Arts (Palacio de Bellas Artes), the Central Alameda (Alameda Central), the Franz Mayer Museum, and the National Graphic Arts Museum (Museo Nacional de Artes Gráficas) are all nearby (see map).

This area harbors every service and means of communication: museums, room & board (see hotel annex for reservations), transport (buses, subways, taxis, and car rental), restaurants, and commerce.

Services within the Palace:

The Palace offers everything a world-class convention center should, excepting reduced facilities for our handicapped visitors.

7.2 LANGUAGE

7.3 SESSIONS MANAGEMENT

For most sessions a moderator and a discussant have been appointed for session management (see schedule by day).

Moderator guidelines

- ◆ Arrive at the session room at least five minutes prior to the scheduled starting time and introduce yourself to the presenters.
- ◆ A room attendant has been appointed to every session room. It is this person's responsibility to take care of the audiovisual equipment and to assist you and the presenters at any time. This room attendant will introduce himself / herself to you at the start.
- ◆ Inform presenters the maximum time they can use for their paper presentation. This time can vary depending on the number of papers in the session and whether there is a discussant who needs time to respond. Introduce the orange and red card system to them (see further).
- ◆ In introducing the session - please be brief - tell the audience how many papers will be presented, how long each presentation will be and when there will be time for questions.
- ◆ For each paper, introduce the author and the title of the paper.
- ◆ In order to facilitate time management of the presentations, a set of orange and red cards will be at your disposal. Show the orange card to the presenter when 5 minutes presentation time is left. Show the red card when time is over.
- ◆ In managing the question-and-answer-time, please ask questioners to identify themselves and to keep their comments as short as possible to allow the presenters to respond in full.
- ◆ Please ensure the session to finish in time. Sessions that overrun will affect next sessions.
- ◆ In case you are presenting a paper yourself during the session you are chairing, we strongly recommend that this be done at the end of the session, even if this means altering the formal program slightly. The efficient management of the session will benefit from it. When presenting your paper ask one of the other presenter to manage your time using the cards.

Discussant guidelines

It is the role of the discussant to raise points of discussion from the papers before opening up the discussion to the audience. The review should be brief enabling time for questions and responses.

Presenter guidelines

- ◆ Upon arrival at the Congress and after picking up your registration materials, presenters are urged to contact the person at the information desk. Hand over the CD-Rom or disk with your PowerPoint-presentation or indicate to this person that you will use other presentation means (slides, overhead projection, video,...).

Please label your presentation with authors name, presentation title, track and sessions number

- ◆ Your PowerPoint presentations will be loaded on the PC in the room where you will be presenting and will be ready at the start of the session. PowerPoint presentations that have not been handed over can NOT be installed on the PC of the session room just before the start of the session!
- ◆ Remember that connecting to the LCD-projector of the room with your own laptop will not be allowed!
- ◆ We encourage you to bring a back-up CD or diskette to the room where you will be presenting.
- ◆ Arrive at the session room at the latest five minutes prior to the scheduled starting time. If you are using another type of visual equipment than standard provided (PowerPoint), you are encouraged to be in the room even earlier.
- ◆ Introduce yourself to the other presenters and to the moderator and discussant. If no moderator is present for whatever reason, please nominate someone among the presenters to act as the time manager for the session.
- ◆ You will be instructed before the session on the length of your presentation. This will inevitably vary between sessions depending on the number of papers to be presented and whether there is a discussant. Usually each speaker will be allowed a maximum of 15 minutes, which means that you will not be able to read your full paper. You therefore need to structure your presentation around key points and arguments. You will not be permitted to speak longer than the allocated time, as this would be unfair to other presenters. The moderator is instructed to intervene by means of a system of colored cards.
- ◆ Within each session some time will be devoted to questions and discussion. There will be many informal opportunities to discuss your ideas with participants at the various social events. So do not feel that you must cram everything into 15 minutes.
- ◆ When presenting your paper, be conscious of the considerable variations that exist within the English language. Furthermore, for many of the participants in the Congress, English may not be their first language. When presenting it is important to consider some basic issues:
 - a. Speak slowly and with great clarity, recognizing that individual country or regional accents may make it difficult to be understood by the audience.
 - b. Note that if you are using terms that are culturally specific, they may not be really understood by individuals from other parts of the world. While it is difficult to avoid using technical terms, there is also a responsibility to explain their meaning.

In summary, it is important that you present the ideas in your paper in a manner that is accessible to a broad range of cultural background of those attending the Congress.

BUSINESS HOURS

Public offices and banks are generally open from 9:00 to 16:00 on weekdays (some banks open on Saturday until 14:00 hrs). Shops are generally open throughout the day from Monday to Saturday from 8:00 until 20:00. Department stores remain open until 22:00.

Currency and credit card

The currency of México is the Mexican peso (\$). One U.S. Dollar is approximately 11.45 Mxn Pesos. One euro is approximately 14.00 Mxn Pesos. Foreign currency can be exchanged to Pesos in most hotels, banks and a number of exchange offices. Credit cards are widely accepted in all kind of shops.
