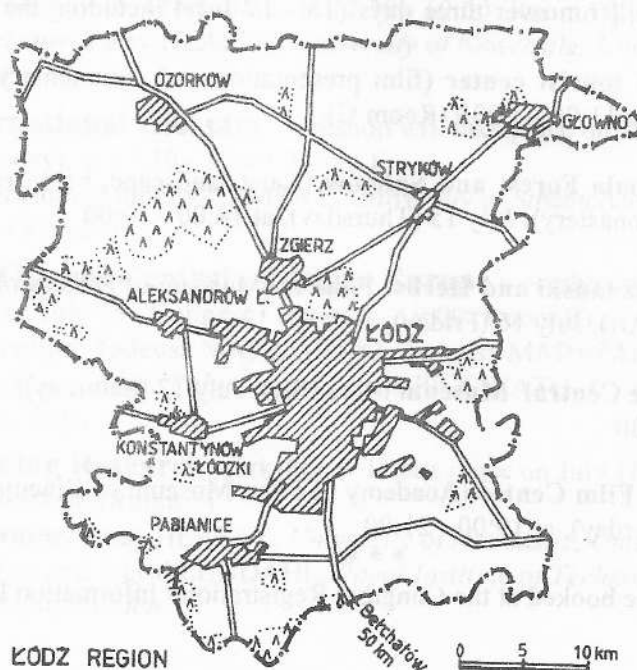

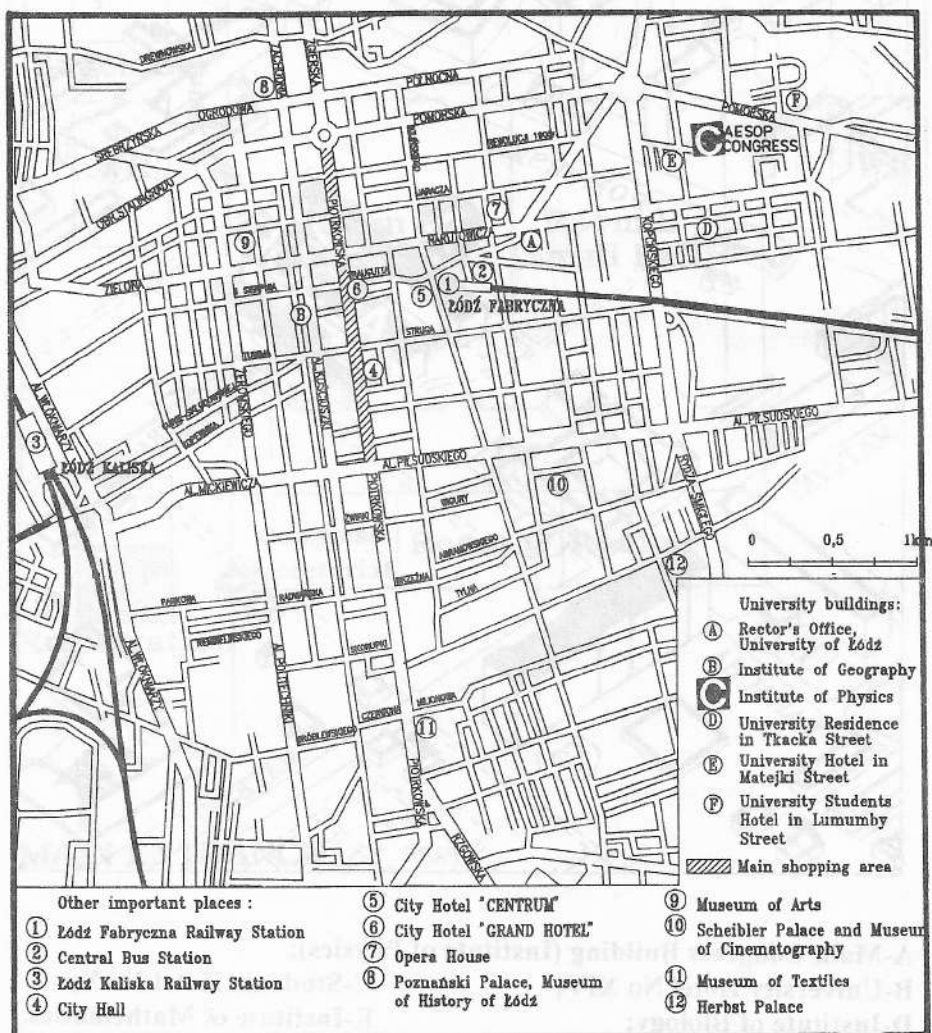

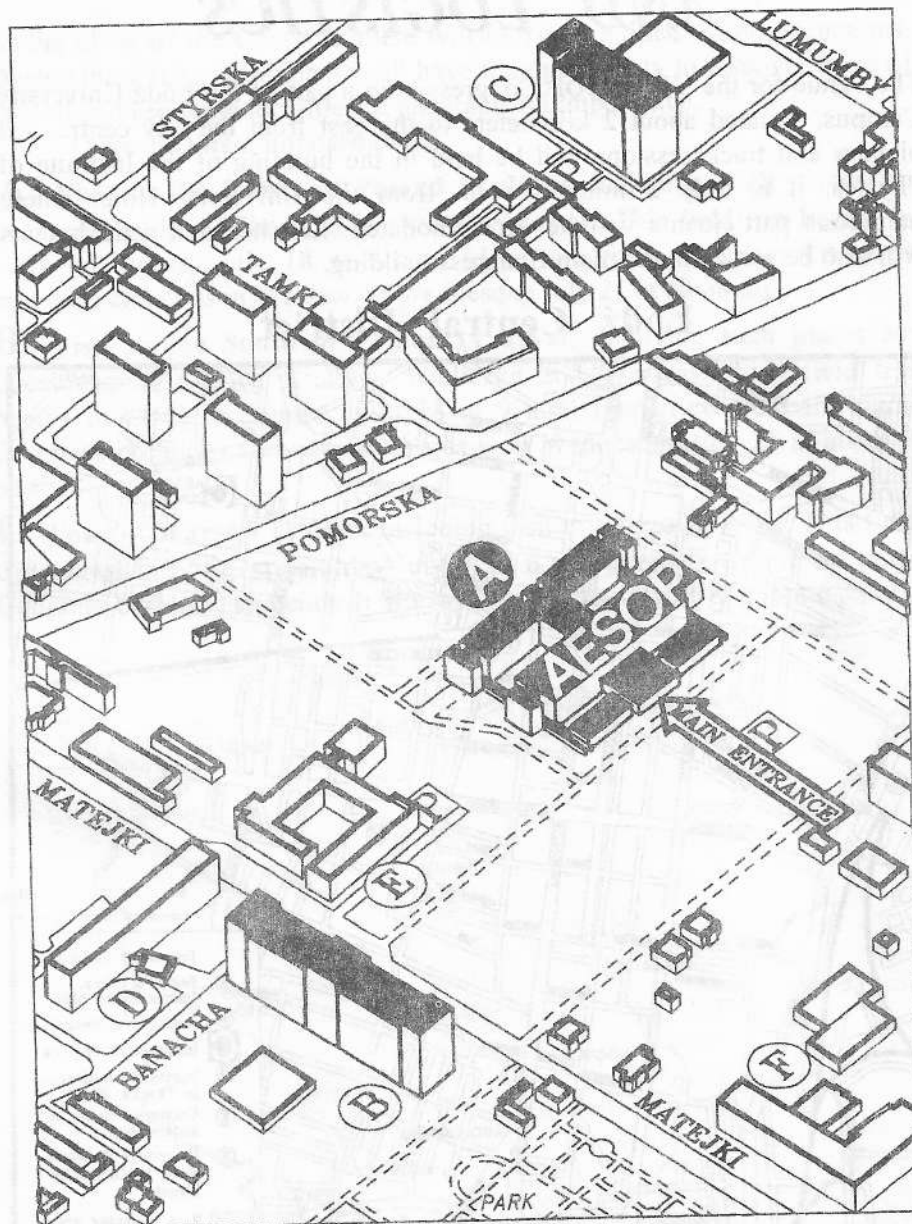
CONGRESS LOCATION AND LOGISTICS

Łódź Central District

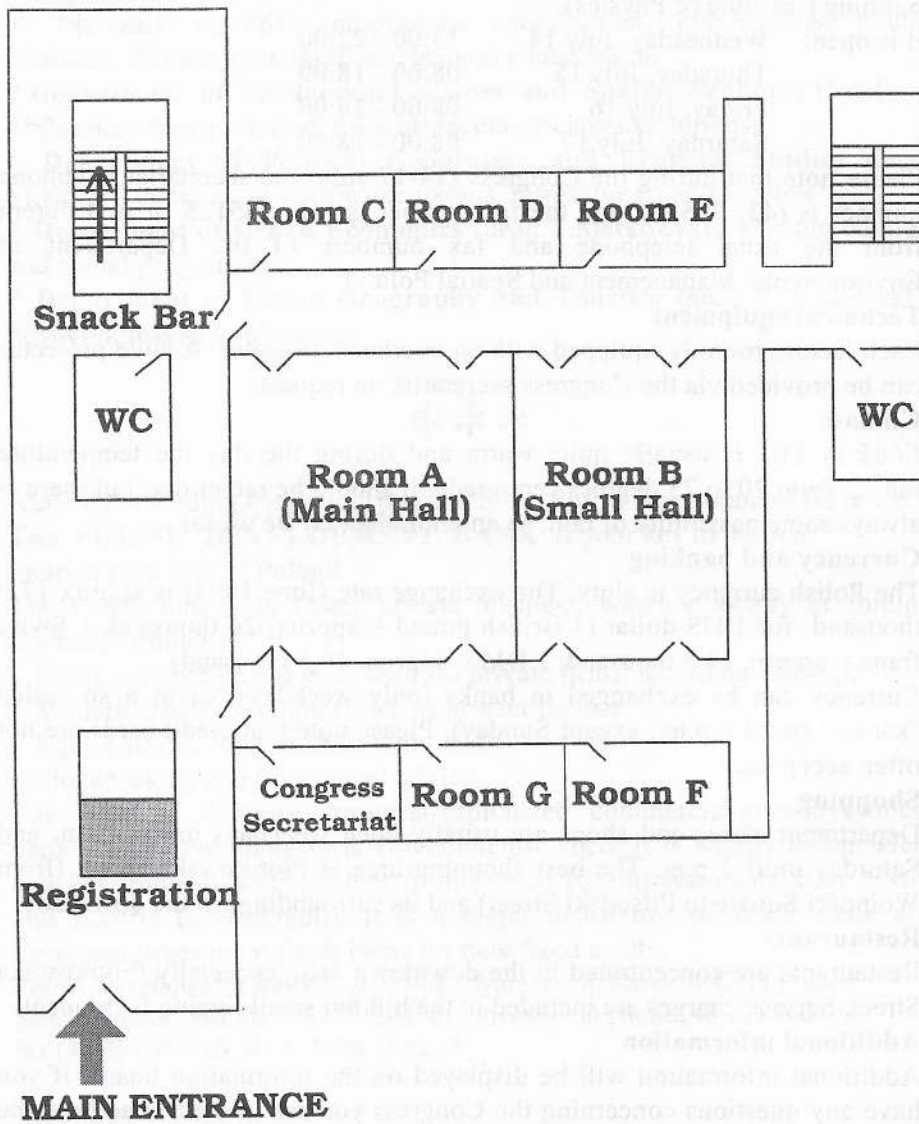


Łódź University Campus (part)

Technical equipment

Each lecture room is equipped with an overhead projector. A slide projector can be provided via the Congress secretariat on request.

Climate

Łódź in July is usually quite warm and during the day the temperature ranges from 20 to 25 degrees centigrade. It should be rather dry, but there is always some possibility of rain, so an umbrella may be useful.

Currency and banking

The Polish currency is zloty. The exchange rate (June 1993) is approx 17,5 thousand for 1 US dollar (1 British pound = approx. 26 thousand, 1 Swiss franc = approx 11,5 thousand, 1 DM = approx. 10,5 thousand)

Currency can be exchanged in banks (only weekdays) or at a so called "kantor" (until 6 p.m., except Sunday). Please note that credit cards are not often accepted.

Shopping

Department stores and shops are usually open weekdays until 6 p.m. and Saturday until 3 p.m. The best shopping area is Piotrkowska Street (from Wolności Square to Piłsudski Street) and its surroundings in the downtown.

Restaurants

Restaurants are concentrated in the downtown area, especially Piotrkowska Street. Service charges are included in the bill but small tipping is frequent.
